Example: (focusing on Fall 2005)

There were 246 African-American students enrolled at Cabrillo in Fall 2005. This constituted 1.6 percent of total enrollment for the term. Out of this group, 69 are enrolled in a Basic Skills course. While this constitutes just 2.0% of the total count of students taking Basic Skills courses, it shows that 28.0% of African-American students were enrolled in a Basic Skills course.
